**Over the past six years, individuals seeking agency services has increased 213%.**

In calendar year **2006**, GED/Adult Literacy classes had **120** new enrollees, and pre-release classes were facilitated in local correctional facilities for **303** adults. There were **8,979** direct services provided to **4,080** walk-in clients, up from **6,658** delivered services to **3,058** clients in **2005** – a **35%** rise in direct services provided, and a **33%** increase in the number of clients served. The agency's youth program provided Survival Skills/Life Skills classes for **783** juveniles. Community support through the years has confirmed a much-needed commitment to PRI's vision: *"To stop the waste of an ex-offender's lifetime and eliminate that cost to society."*

**256% increase in services provided 2001 – 2006.**

- 338 individuals with TOMIS Numbers who came to PRI for services between 1/20/04 and 12/21/05 completed the Job Readiness Program and received other PRI services
- Of the 338 who completed the program:
  - 293 individuals are still in the community
  - 45 individuals were re-incarcerated as of 6/8/06
- The recidivism rate for individuals who completed PRI Job Readiness Program during 24 month period (1/04 – 12/05) is **13.3%**
- The annual 2004-2005 recidivism rate for individuals released by the TDOC was **43%**
- The national recidivism rate as reported by Bureau of Justice Statistics is **55%**
- Underemployment or joblessness can trigger a downward spiral for the ex-offender, cycling him or her back into the prison system.
- Ex-offenders offer a pool of potential workers for the millions of high technology, health care, and other jobs that go unfilled because businesses cannot find enough qualified workers.
